Disley & Newtown Lifesavers

There are now at least 9 defib units across Disley & Newtown and the Parish Council is keen to raise awareness of where they are and how to use them. Defibrillators are pieces of equipment which can restart the heart if it has stopped due to a cardiac arrest. So, they can literally be life savers. There is a list of units included here but if anyone knows of any more, please let the Parish Council know. A new external unit will shortly be commissioned at Disley Methodist Church on the A6, following fund-raising and grants from Disley Parish Council and the Poynton Area Community Partnership.



The Council also recently partnered with North West Ambulance Service to deliver some defib and CPR training at the Community Centre. These sessions were well-attended and had very positive feedback such as, "the training was so very worthwhile. Now if someone in a cardiac situation needed help, I would be able to respond instead of just standing around not knowing what to do." The Council hopes to run further sessions in the new year.

We're not at home to Doorstep Crime





Disley Parish Council, Cheshire East Trading Standards and Cheshire Constabulary hosted a joint event recently to raise awareness of bogus callers and doorstep criminals. The event started with a homemade soup and roll lunch, kindly provided by Parish Councillors, before Paul Unwin from Cheshire East Council Trading Standards gave a fascinating presentation on the tricks used by these criminals. Paul also gave plenty of tips on how residents can deal with these unwanted visitors.

PC Dave Jackson and PCSO Joe Street then outlined the legalities of what the criminals are doing and shared some useful experiences of their own. The event was very well-attended and attendees had a chance to raise their own queries and talk to the group about situations they had been involved in. The Parish Council has "No Cold Calling" window stickers and leaflets available at the Community Centre for any residents who would like them.





20 years of footpath conservation



Disley Footpaths Society was formed in 1999 with the aim of helping to ensure that the footpaths in the parish of Disley and Newtown were free from obstruction, adequately signed and well maintained. This year it is celebrating 20 years of (hard) work and over the years most local footpaths have had remedial work carried out on them by the Society, with many needing recurring maintenance.

The first job undertaken by the society, under the guidance of the, then, Cheshire County Public Rights of Way, was to construct a bridge across a very damp section of FP20 (which goes from the A6 down to the railway line) and improve the surface. The workers pictured are (L-R) Peter Birkett, Joan Flynn, Tom Featherstone, Jim Amos and Pat Featherstone. In 2004 the Ramblers Association recognised the work of the Society, including the innovative footpath monitoring scheme, by giving it a national award. Since then, a busy programme of maintenance of over 70 footpaths has continued on an annual basis. For larger projects, such as Footpath 45 (Higgins Clough swing bridge down to Waterside), the help of the Cheshire East Public Rights of Way Unit has been needed and their continuing support is welcomed. In 2015, with the support of Disley Parish Council, the Society took the lead in applying for and achieving national "Walkers are Welcome" accreditation for the village.

In 2017, the Society took over management of the Disley Towpath Action Group - a volunteer group who work closely with the Canal & River Trust to maintain and improve the towpath of the Peak Forest Canal.

The Friends of Disley Station (FODS) is a group of local people with an interest in serving the community and making Disley train station and its surrounding area a nicer and safer place.

This voluntary group is also interested in trying to make the railway better serve the train customers of Disley. For example, FODS contributed to securing the increase in train frequency announced some time ago.

Recently, a lot of hard work has been put into removing weeds, cutting back foliage and filling planters to add some colour. The next FODS project is to landscape the Buxton side of the platform. Through its involvement with the High Peak and Hope Valley Rail Partnership, FODS has been able to secure grants for new notice boards at the station.

The group is currently awaiting new shelters, hopefully before winter, and is campaigning for better signage, shading for the new ticket machine and platform humps for wheelchair and buggy users.




Free Lyme for Heritage Open Day

On Saturday 21st September 2019, the National Trust at Lyme will be throwing open it's gates for everyone to visit for free as part of Heritage Open Days. This is a UK-wide celebration of historic sites. Alongside open access to the park, house and gardens, there will be activities across the day themed around the actions that people can take to help alleviate climate change, and to care for our special landscapes for the future.

Join the rangers to discover how rainfall and rivers affect environments with a special augmented reality sandbox, learn about greener gardening and recycling, and celebrate sports and activities that leave no trace with soft archery sessions, Tai Chi and taster walks from Stockport Nordic Walking.

To encourage visitors to use greener transport to Lyme, the free Park and Ride bus (normally an hourly service from Hazel Grove on Sundays and Bank Holidays) will be running all the way from Stockport Bus station.



Meet your Councillors



Disley Parish Council is keen for residents to get to know a bit more about their local Councillors and what motivates them. Parish Councillors are elected by residents every four years to represent the views of all sections of the community. They are expected to act in a fair, honest and selfless manner and do not receive any payment for their time.

In this edition we meet Cllr. Cath Birchall who was elected to the Council in May and chairs the Council's Finance Committee.

What did you/do you do for a living?

I currently work for the People's History Museum in Manchester as Deputy Director, looking after the finance and operations of the Museum. Although the travel to Manchester is sometimes stressful, I appreciate the return commute home through the countryside of Greater Manchester and Cheshire.

Do you have a family, pets etc.?

My husband Steve, who is also a Parish Councillor, and I have lived in Disley since 1988, having returned from London with the need to live somewhere that would allow me to work in Manchester and Steve in Chesterfield. It's not just the location that appealed to us, I knew Disley from previous trips to do orienteering in Lyme Park as part of my school days at Loretto College. We then had two children who both attended Disley Primary and Poynton High School. I know their childhood and my parenthood would not have been the same if not for this village. I strongly believe that it takes a village to raise a child and I'm so grateful for all the facilities, community groups and spirited people that exist within Disley and Newtown. From midwives, health visitors and nurses to playgroups, toddler groups, libraries, schools, brownies and scouts. I've probably missed loads but as a working mother the help of such good people is an appreciated necessity.

More recently my father's Alzheimer's disease meant he moved in with us and again the community help with coffee mornings and good neighbours was terrific.

What are your hobbies and interests?

In my spare time, I'm on the board of Trustees at Manchester Jewish Museum and the Pankhurst Centre. I also am a prolific reader, so my commute gives me time to keep this up despite a busy schedule.

What made you want to become a Parish Councillor?

Through the Parish Council, I would like to support all the above local groups and encourage the next generation of community leaders and helpers. There is a lot to do and trying to make fair decisions within limited budgets is an issue I'm very familiar with, so, in these early months I'm trying hard to make sense of the figures.

If you could change one thing about the village, what would it be?

If I could change one thing it would obviously be the excessive amount of traffic on the A6 which pollutes the air and virtually cuts the village in half. Although there's a lot to sort out, I believe with positivity and the community behind us we'll find some solutions.

As well as supplying a wide range of books to borrow and access to the public network computers, the library offers an access point for many Cheshire East Council services including the verification of documents for benefit claims. Eligible Cheshire East residents can apply for bus passes and blue badges in the library and they can also obtain a discount code to use when applying for senior and disabled railcards.

Younger customers enjoy the free weekly Rhyme time, Lego and Megablock sessions, as well as additional 'pop up' events and activities throughout the school holidays. This years' Summer Reading Challenge has a "Space Chase" theme.

Let's Tackle Himalayan Balsam



Himalayan Balsam (Impatiens glandulifera), is a nonnative plant which spreads very rapidly, smothers other plants and wildlife and leads to soil erosion.

A lot of Himalayan Balsam has been reported across the village recently, so the Parish Council, in conjunction with the Disley Footpaths Society, are asking for residents help with a bit of Balsam bashing. Himalayan Balsam can grow up to 3 metres in height; has hollow stems that turn from green to a pinkish-red in spring; long (up to 15cm), slender, green leaves and slipper shaped flowers from June-October that range from almost white to a pinkish-purple. The best method of removing Himalayan Balsam is to cut the plant down below the lowest node or to pull it out by hand. The plant comes up easily and is completely non-toxic, making this a safe and reliable method. If seed pods are present, these should be removed and bagged before attempts are made to remove the plant. Happy bashing!



All quiet in the garden




