Street Co-ordinator Scheme

Within hours of the official announcement of the global pandemic, Disley Parish Council and local volunteers had set up a network of Street Co-ordinators. Within days, every street in Disley and Newtown had a named contact and households received a calling card offering assistance. The Scheme has undertaken hundreds of tasks for residents from delivering shopping and picking up







prescriptions, to collecting library books and simply phoning for a chat. There are still over fifty residents available to help the community and all have pledged their commitment to keep supporting their neighbours for as long as necessary. This selfless group are providing a lifeline to many people and they should feel as proud of their volunteering, as the community is grateful for their support.

Village businesses

So many local businesses and their dedicated staff have supported the community during Covid, that it is impossible to pick out individuals. However, to every local business who has kept prescriptions flowing, delivered food and drink, supplied a light bulb and changed their hours to suit the needs of the community, we are all grateful.

Schoolhouse Surgery

Through highly testing times, Dr. Maurice and the Surgery staff have been available to answer queries, provide advice and help the village wherever possible. The Surgery is now back open providing flu clinics, blood tests and many other treatments.

Disley Primary School and village preschools

As we all know, Coronavirus has placed incredible pressures on schools and pre-

schools, and Disley's dedicated staff worked tirelessly to maintain services and allow pupils to return to education safely. They continue to do everything they can to minimise disruption and upset for pupils and all parents appreciate the levels of hard work it takes to achieve this.

All our voluntary groups

There have been so many acts of kindness from our local groups that we couldn't fit them all in the Disley News, but some which the Parish Council has been made aware of include: St. Mary's Church Long Table Lunch delivering over 40 hot meals a month all over the village, Good Neighbours ferrying many residents to hospital and doctors' appointments and the Community Bus drivers who are doing socially-distanced shopping trips to help residents get out and about again.

Individual residents of Disley and Newtown

Again, the individual acts of kindness and thoughtfulness shown by individuals in the village has been amazing, whether it is doing an NHS fundraising run around the estate, picking up shopping for those shielding or organising some outdoor line dancing. We are all very lucky to be part of such a caring and supportive community and two little words do not seem adequate to convey our gratitude. THANK YOU.

Disley Events, which works with Disley Golf Club, were proud to declare the event a resounding success. As well as providing the community with a new annual event for adults and children it was decided to donate part of the proceeds to Disley Primary school. A cheque for £500 was handed to Heather Taylor, Co-Headteacher at Disley Primary School, by John Mott and Imogen Ford (an ex-pupil of Disley Primary). The donation will be used to provide items to teach the children the value of recycling in the community.

Unfortunately, the 2020 bonfire has had to be cancelled due to the Covid restrictions but hopefully, it will be back in 2021 with a mega celebratory bonfire and fireworks display for the people of Disley! The library looks forward to welcoming you back.





Disley Community Bus scheme has been running for over six years and, having taken an enforced break through the Coronavirus lockdown, it is now back on the road again. The Parish Council has re-started the regular weekly shopper trip to a local supermarket enabling a group of less-mobile users to get out to the shops with our door-todoor-service. Before too long, the bus will also be taking residents on short trips into the local countryside to enjoy a picturesque drive. Pre Covid-19, the bus operated a busy programme of short and long trips all over the North West including Bury Market, Southport, Chester, garden centres and pub lunches. Whilst it is unlikely that full day trips will be possible any time soon, it is hoped that more short trips can be organised to give residents a chance to get out and about safely. Passengers currently have plenty of space in the 14-seater bus as trips have been restricted to 4 passengers for social distancing purposes and Covid-19 measures have been implemented to keep everyone as safe as possible. A remarkable team of dedicated volunteer drivers give up their time to drive the bus and they have our heartfelt thanks. Without them, the scheme simply could not run. Running Mates

In Autumn 2019 Disley Runners were delighted to receive a grant from Disley Parish Council. This grant enabled the group to buy a large flag, which could be seen flying high in Lyme Park on New Year's Eve during the Bowstones Fell Race and at numerous other events. The grant also helped to train the Runners' first England Athletics/FRA certified run leader. Having run leaders allows the group to offer safer, insured running activities and coaching for new and regular runners. Then in 2020, Malt Disley Micro-bar and Bottle Shop on Market Street, Disley, very kindly agreed to sponsor Disley Runners for the year. This allowed the group to train up further run leaders and develop their website. Sadly, lockdown meant club activities ceased for a while, but they are now, literally, up and running again, following EA guidelines for Covid-secure activities. Disley Runners run on Tuesday evenings (a 5-6km coached training session for all) and Thursday evenings (a 10km social trail run). All that work over the summer months finally comes to fruition when many vegetables and fruits mature. This year at Disley Allotments has been quite a good growing season despite the very erratic weather conditions.
