

# St. Mary's Church Surveying for now and the future

In 2024, St. Mary's Church will have been keeping watch over Disley, serving and ministering to the local community, for 500 years.

If it is to continue to do so for another 500 years or, indeed, another 50 years, it will need strategies for the restoration and maintenance of its ancient structure, and for its sustainability as part of the fabric of the Disley community.

The Church needs the involvement of the local community to help develop these important strategies and has launched a survey to do this.

The history of St. Mary's goes back to 1510 and a small Chapel with tower was completed in 1524, hence the 500-year anniversary in 2024. Henry VIII was on the throne at the time of its completion, and it was extended significantly in the 19th century. As a Grade II\* Listed Building of historical importance, it requires careful looking after.

The challenges St. Mary's faces in 2023 and beyond are:-

#### Restoration

A 500-year-old Grade II\* Listed Building needs constant care, repair, maintenance and restoration, so the church has recently launched the St. Mary's 500 Restoration Appeal. £330,000/£350,000 is needed to fully restore the ancient structure and this will have to be raised through a combination of grant funding, donations, fundraising and the use of reserves.

Phase 1 of this project requires the urgent restoration of the Tower and West End elevations and will hopefully start by Spring 2024. This has an estimated cost of £200,000. Phase 2, the restoration of the remainder of St. Mary's structure, will follow and has an estimated cost of £130,000/£150,000.

#### Sustainability:

Currently, the entire financial existence of St. Mary's is dependent on its church family, and they alone provide for the worship and ministries in Disley Parish, the upkeep of the church building and church grounds, the payment of all expenses and a contribution towards the salary of the Vicar. The annual cost of these expenses and outgoings is approx. £100,000 i.e. £2,000 per week.

With no Government, Diocese of Chester or other external support, St. Mary's has to find ways to ensure financial sustainability. However, sustainability is not just about funding St. Mary's current position, it is also about how to sustain the future of the church and fellowship as central parts of the local community.

St. Mary's would like to understand the views of as many people as possible regarding its future and its place and role in the community.

The survey is now open via the QR code. The consultation is open until 24th June. The link is also available at St. Mary's Parish Church, the Disley website and in the Disley Parish Council eBulletin.

Disley took advantage of a Cheshire East Council initiative to provide warm locations across the village to those who needed a bit of warmth, a bit of company or a mixture of both. Hot drinks, often some food, and plenty of good will were provided at all locations.

Disley Parish Council received a grant from Cheshire East Council which was used to fund a simple soup and a roll lunch twice a month and a programme of Sunday afternoon film shows. These gatherings proved very popular and it is hoped that the lunches will continue, and the film shows may re-start in the Autumn. As always, many Disley volunteers came forward

to help to run these community events and we are truly grateful for their help in keeping our residents warm this winter.

### Wow! Doesn't the Community Hub look good for its age?

Disley Parish Council has recently been giving the Community Centre, or Community Hub as it is also known, some much-deserved TLC. The building is now over 30 years old and has been serving the Disley and Newtown community non-stop, (with a brief interlude for a global pandemic) for all that time. As part of its Parish Strategy, the Council agreed that the time was right to give the Centre a bit of attention. Over the past couple of years, work to the roof and Velux windows has stopped any leaks and in the last 12 months some interior and exterior improvements have really updated the place.

Outside, the car park has been re-lined, the messy flower bed has been replaced with turf and an unsightly bush has been removed and a new bench fitted. New signs have also been put up to highlight the partnership between the Parish Council and Disley Library. The main entrance has been improved with a colourful new roller-shutter door. Inside, the hall has been painted from top to bottom and the wooden floor has been treated to a sand and polish. New curtains have been fitted and new chairs are on the way. There are still some items to complete, such as new litter bins and another bench outside, but the Community Hub is well on the way to being ready for its next 30 years of service.









### St. Mary's Church Food Bank

Since November 2022, St. Mary's Church has been running a food bank every Thursday between 12.00-15.00 from the church on Red Lane. Originally operating in conjunction with the Warm Places initiative, the food bank will continue to run with the same hours, even though Warm Places has now ended. The church is able to provide basic non-perishable food essentials for those with a need. It is free and does not operate any form of voucher system. So far, there has been limited use of the foodbank so if there continues to be no further demonstrable need, they will have to close the service at the end of May. This is a real case of 'use it or lose it.'











### Foul behaviour on the canal

Thanks are due to the Canals and Rivers Trust for putting up new dog fouling signage on the canal towpath between Redhouse Lane and Lower Greenshall Lane.

A number of residents raised the issue of dog fouling on the towpath with Disley Parish Council and no sooner was it reported, than the new signs appeared.

Dog fouling is a criminal offence and can result in a £100 fixed penalty notice or, for prosecution in a magistrate's court, a maximum fine of £1,000.

Hopefully, dog owners, and their dogs, will take note of the signs and help to keep this lovely amenity in a clean condition.

# The trials and tribulations of a community bus

Disley's Community Bus continues to provide a full programme of social trips, many of which have been fully booked. These include pub lunches and garden centres, and day trips such as Skipton, Southport, Liverpool and the ever popular Bury Market. The Weekly Shoppers Group provides a vital service to some of the less-mobile members of the community.

Sadly, the bus was the target of thieves and vandals in 2022/23 with the fuel tank damaged and a full tank of diesel stolen and, in a separate incident, the rear windows and a rear light were smashed. These acts led to the bus being off the road for a while but Council Officers worked hard to secure and repair the bus in a very timely manner to minimise disruption.

Some new group hirers have recently joined the scheme, making further use of this community resource and the bus was used as an invaluable shuttle service for Disley Show and the Community Bonfire and Firework display held at Disley Golf Club.

Bus scheme members were delighted to receive a generous donation from funds raised at the Community Bonfire to support the continued operation of the bus. (See separate article). Everyone is welcome, particularly those with


Dementia/Alzheimer's and their carers, plus those who live alone and would enjoy the company of others.


Disley Golf Club's Kinder View lounge has stunning views and an array of food, wines and cocktails and is open for everyone to enjoy.

### **Disley Ladies Probus**

Disley Ladies Probus have already had some fascinating meetings in 2023. In February, they had three visitors from Greater Manchester Blood Bikes. This was a very thought provoking talk as many attendees didn't realise that this emergency service is totally run by volunteers! They provide an out of hours service from 7.00pm until 6.00am Monday to Friday as well as 24 hour cover at weekends and over public holidays. The Greater Manchester team work in conjunction with other Blood Bike groups across the country, even across to Ireland, delivering vital supplies of blood, emergency medication, organ tissue samples, even frozen donated breast milk. The biggest cost for the service is fuel and insurance for their fleet of six bikes and four vehicles. Consequently, voluntary donations were collected at the meeting and £146 was raised and given to the volunteers from Blood Bikes. If you are interested in attending Disley Ladies Probus, they meet on the first Monday of the month in the Community Centre at 10.15am. They also meet on an informal social basis, often for lunch out at local hostelries. This year, their annual MacMillan Coffee Morning will be held on Saturday 23rd September. Disley Ladies Probus hope as many people as possible can attend and will be putting up posters around the village soon.

# A challenging read



This Summer, Disley Library will be running the popular Summer Reading Challenge 2023 both in the library and online too. The theme this year is Ready, Steady, Read and is being run with the Youth Sport Trust, with a theme of sports and games.

Lyme is currently awaiting the outcome of a planning application that was submitted in March to restore an historic water course and grassland and relocate the main car park. This work will help protect the property from flooding as well as restoring original views of the house. The proposed plans do not increase the number of spaces that they currently have but ensure that car parking spaces can be used all year round.

The application is an enabler to further work on the estate which includes looking at efficiencies at the admissions hut to further reduce congestion on the A6. You can find out more about the project on the National Trust Lyme website.
